Pastor's Note

Perhaps you remember a few years ago that our whole United Methodist Church was studying about Mexico. At that time I was serving a church in an area with a high population of Hispanic people, yet I realized that I did not have any friends or acquaintances who were Hispanic. So I decided to do something about it, and I went to Walmart to buy Hispanic produce. I wanted to know what they were and what kinds of fruits and vegetable the Hispanic people eat. I walked and walked, but could not figure out what I was looking for. I looked around and found a Hispanic woman and I asked some questions, but she could not understand my English. I began to use gestures, and she seemed to get what I meant. She pointed out different fruits and vegetable, and I bought lots of different Hispanic produce. I bought jicama, mangos and many different kinds of peppers, corn and other tropical fruits. Again I used gestures to ask for her phone number so that we could build our friendship, and she wrote her number on a piece of paper.

Several times I visited her home with my daughter. She offered me food. We kept up our friendship until I moved to Naperville.

Friendship is the first step in doing mission. Mission is possible if we are willing to connect and willing to take risks. Our Community church has been very good about sending mission money to other states and overseas. This church is also very supportive of mission trips to other states and overseas. But we also have an opportunity to mission in our area not far from where we live to engage in mission.

Our mission committee has made the commitment to go to Rockford on Saturday, October 29, to be a part of the Rockford Urban Ministry (RUM) and to make connection with the people they serve.

The author named Tom Brandy has written, "Mission is not what you do in and for the internal church organization, but what you do among and for the local, regional, and global general public."

RUM is an outreach of 19 United Methodist churches in the Rockford area aimed at bringing Christ's love to the inner city through a variety of programs. No special skills required, but willing heart to share will be a good beginning. As John Wesley's words remind us "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can." Please join us in this opportunity to do good.

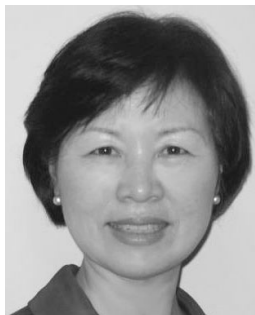
Give me your trash, your treats . . .

Bats in the Belfry?

It's true; there have been sightings of bats in CUMC. Over the past several weeks there have been two incidents of bats being found within the church. Because of the potential health concerns of bats being in close proximity to people, a professional exterminator was called in. The exterminator confirmed the presence of the bats, identified their access point, and eradicated them from the facility. The eradication took place on September 12 and the exterminator provided a one year warrantee that they will provide follow-up services if the bats return.

What Is A Stephen Minister?

Recently I was asked this question by one of our active parishioners. I was somewhat taken aback that after a thirteen year history of Stephen Ministry in our church, that people are still unaware of its role and purpose. Stephen Ministers are Individuals within our church community who are recruited, trained and commissioned to provide "distinctively Christian caregiving" to those who need a listening presence during stressful times. Stephen Ministers are "compassionate" meaning that they are able to share the sufferings of their care receivers. They provide a nonjudgmental listening ear and spiritual support but do not act as a problem solver. Stephen Ministers are "full of faith" and rely upon God as the wound healer and sustainer as the third party in the caring relationship. Stephen Ministers are "skilled" in knowing how to listen, understand and empathize. These skills are developed during the initial 50 hours of Stephen Ministry training and strengthened through twice-monthly supervision meetings. Stephen Ministers are "trustworthy" as they are committed to maintaining confidentiality, visiting care receivers regularly, and remaining in their ministry role. Stephen Ministers are following a path of discipleship and serve according to Paul's words to the Galatians—"Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."
